Robert J. Sitkowski is Of Counsel with the law firm of Branse, Willis and Knapp, LLC in Glastonbury, Connecticut. Freilich on the second edition of the landmark American Bar Association book *From Sprawl to Smart Growth*, and was a contributor to Daniel Slone's and Doris Goldstein's 2008 Wiley book *A Legal Guide to Urban and Sustainable Development for Planners, Developers and Architects*. He is a past winner of the American Planning Association's R. Marlin Smith writing prize, and in 2002, he was named one of the "New Leaders of the Law" by the *Connecticut Law Tribune*.
